ear Friends of THE Redeemer,

As you may be aware, October 31 is the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation. This is the day in 1517 Martin Luther (an Augustinian monk) nailed (church doors were wooden) 95 Theses (statements in Latin to be debated by scholars) to the door of the Wittenberg church (the official community bulletin board at the center of the city). These statements challenged the church's practice of selling indulgences (pieces of paper which guaranteed years off your/another's sentence in purgatory). Essentially, the church was

selling Christ's forgiveness.

So why bring this up for this newsletter? Beginning September 10 we will be starting an 8-week worship series on the unique Biblical teachings which came out of the movement. It will conclude on Sunday, October 29.

The Sunday morning Bible studies will also focus on the Reformation. One study will focus on Martin Luther and the Lutheran reformation. The other will study various other reformers before, during, and after Luther.

#### On the Road

I'm choosing to call this column "On the Road" because so much of Jesus' ministry of discipleship and outreach happened as he traveled from place to place proclaiming the Kingdom of God. So we'll just talk about different ways growing and reaching can look like in this column, and my reflections on both.




One thing that pops into my head when I talk about discipleship is all the Biblical imagery of growth and growing. The righteous are frequently compared to plants or trees that just keep growing and producing fruit (see Psalm 1 for instance). Jesus talks about how He is the vine and we are the branches (John 15). Paul also frequently talks about the Body of Christ growing and becoming mature by everyone working together in harmony and building each other up.

All of this is to say that in the gospel we are given a new life which is rich and flourishing. As we cling to the promises of God given to us through Jesus, we enter into a new world where we can grow and flourish as God's children. We grow since we don't have to fear our past because we are forgiven. We grow as we know that God will receive us always and be with us through Word and Sacrament. We grow as we learn to trust Jesus and walk with him throughout our life. We grow as we learn to forgive and love others. And God grows us also by using the gifts and talents we bring to the table to build others up and share the love of Jesus. The gospel is a life of growth. That's an important aspect of discipleship: that God will grow us as we walk with Jesus.

### Classroom Connection—2nd Grade







## 2017 Albuquerque L WML Convention News

At the diamond (75<sup>th</sup>) anniversary celebration held in Albuquerque, New Mexico, the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, also known as Lutheran Women in Mission, a new LWML logo was unveiled. The LWML

has only had two logos in its 75 year history; and looking ahead to the next 75 years of mites, missions, ministry, and mentoring, the leaders chose the logo shown above: The Heart, the Drop of Blood, the Cross.

The heart of God is behind all that we are and do (John 3:16 For God so loved the world....)

Therefore we lift high the cross of Christ...guiding our thanks and praise and service...(Hebrews 9:22... without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins.)

So that His heart is impressed upon our own...and by the Spirit we are blessed with joy and peace...(1 Corinthians 11:36 For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes.)

The 2015-2017 Mite Box goal of \$2 million was reached, and at convention a goal of \$2,075,000 was adopted. Delegates elected the following mission grants to receive Mite Box support for 2017-2019:

### WOW! Witness on Wednesdays

I'm a name tag wearer. A real estate agent by trade, I believe name tags serve as a wonderful way to start conversations. For example, I'm standing in the grocery line and the person next to me glances at my tag and says, "So, you're a realtor, hunh? How's the market right now?"

My husband is terrible with first names and feels everyone should wear a nametag as they go about their daily lives. After attending Sunday services we often stop to run errands. Still donning our church nametags, we have, on numerous occasions, fielded questions about Redeemer. Once again, the nametag started a conversation we may have otherwise never enjoyed.

One way to facilitate our church's mission—"reaching out into the community to do what's best for the community"—is by simply making an introduction. What better way than to wear our nametags out in the "real world"—not just when we are attending church? Attaching them to your shirt takes only a second and costs nothing. And, it can easily be the impetus for further conversation.... "You go to Redeemer Church? Isn't that the church with a school? What do you like about their worship services?"

Sure, some of us have jobs that may not allow nametags to be displayed. However, we can all certainly pin it on after work. You never know who may see it as we stop to pick up a pizza for dinner or to pump gas. I've decided to put this easy witnessing effort into motion by pinning on my Redeemer nametag every Wednesday. I'll remember it by the acronym *WOW*-Witness on Wednesday.

onations to TCMC provide comfort, assist in education, and sometimes are a lifeline to the needy at several mission sites, especially Haiti and Guatemala. So, what happens to the donations given by friends and members of Redeemer?

Empty vitamin and prescription bottles are taken to MFI (Missionary Flight International) who "stand in the gap" for more than 500 missions in Haiti, the Dominican Republic and the Bahamas. The bottles are offered to clinics at mission sites, schools and orphanages. MFI charges \$1.50 per pound to transport anything directly to a nearby airfield, where they are picked up by the mission. MFI also serves as a mailroom for these missions - transporting letters, orders from Amazon, food, building material, clothing, and anything of any size or shape, requested by the missions. Donated t-shirts are scrutinized and offered to missions to help clothe children and adults. The stained or torn ones are used as rags by the MFI mechanics (all pilots with MFI are also mechanics).

There is a continuous need for <u>school and office supplies</u> at schools in Guatemala and Haiti. Last year, after providing backpacks with 2 pencils and 1 pen for 900 children, Gayle asked a principal if he had any paper for the children to write on. His reply, "Oh no, we haven't had any paper for two years!" Thanks to generous donations, TCMC was able to provide it within a week.

<u>Guatemala</u> has a Christian school started by a teacher/missionary couple in 1965. Today, she is 88 and he is 77. They may not be able to pay the teachers or have enough food to eat, but they are there everyday serving the community. Because of donations (especially from Redeemer Lutheran Church and School) there are backpacks, pencils, paper, and pictures on the walls.

TCMC works with HFMC (Habitat for Children Ministries) to provide supplies and teacher training to 4 schools in Haiti. Being the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, approximately 50% of Haitians have no school to attend and 90% of primary schools are non-public and managed by communities or religious organizations. Since 80% of teachers have received no training, TCMC focuses on providing supplies and training to administrators and teachers. The typical Haitian classroom has one or two chalkboards and usually very little or no chalk. No pictures, no manipulatives, no pencils, pens, crayons, or paper. But - each chalkboard has a Bible verse for the day at the top. Through the generous support of the Redeemer community, TCMC has scheduled numerous teacher in-service days. Knowing that many of these teachers only made it through 6th grade makes the possibilities for improvement unlimited. Classrooms without doors, offices without file folders, staplers or computers, teachers with no supplies except chalk and averaging \$75 per month pay (and most of that is never received) is typical. When asked, "why do the teachers show up?" I was told that there is nothing else to do, so why not go and try to help improve the community by teaching. Opportunities to serve by donating items or by training teachers abound. Flights with MFI to Pignon, Haiti are \$540 per person and if you have at least a 10th grade education, you are qualified.

We often see children in little or no clothing, so donations of <u>clothing</u>, <u>shoes</u>, <u>toiletries</u>, <u>medical supplies</u>, <u>household goods</u> are invaluable. We have a network of trustworthy people: missionaries, pastors, evangelists, doctors or nurses, who accept our donations and give them out as they see the need. We also keep supplies at the mission houses, which allows the community to recognize a Christian presence. Children and baby clothing and shoes are always in demand - TCMC sorts them and sends them to Guatemala and Haiti by boat or plane (MFI).

Since 2/3 of Haitians and about 1/2 of Guatemalans have no regular job and the average pay is \$2-\$5 per day, TCMC provides opportunities, as donations permit. This means that when we receive <u>material</u>, <u>yarn</u>, <u>tools</u>, <u>equipment</u>, <u>etc.</u> we contact the various missions and send them where most needed. In Haiti quilts are sewn by hand and treadle sewing machines can make clothing. In Guatemala we are developing sewing, backstrap weaving and other projects (such as chickens) to help bring in a little income to families.

TCMC also helps coordinate food distributions from various charitable organizations. Several members at Redeemer sponsor a child in Guatemala - \$40 monthly for food, or Haiti - \$15 monthly for education or a one time donation of \$26 to feed 100 children a nutritious rice/bean mixture. Distributions allow the missions and us to share faith lessons, devotions and prayers with the people whose lives we touch.

So, why does TCMC do this? We make Americans aware of opportunities to serve by "going" or donating. We also know where the donations go and are sure that they arrive at the destination and are distributed properly. But, mostly we are a Christian presence, on a small scale, following Matthew 25:35-40.
