Dear Friends of THE Redeemer,
Florida living has many advantages – lots of sun, the big blue ocean, citrus fruit, fresh seafood, and no snow to shovel. However, there are a few things I miss about the north, especially in October – no hurricanes, the fall colors, a crisp apple, the cool evening air, and the lack of bugs. I guess this goes to show there is give and take no matter where you live.

The same could be said of the Church. Although there is never any give and take in what we profess in faith as followers of Jesus (the Word never changes), there is give and take in how we do ministry. As we strive to fulfill our mission motto – *Reaching out into the community to do what is best for the community and share the love of Jesus through word and action* – we will try some new things, tweak the areas going well, and dump the stuff that has run its course.

Here are some things which are in the works. Cornerstone Fellowship, our mission plant in St Lucie County, is moving forward. There is a small group beginning to meet and we continue our search for a church planting pastor. Second, we are currently exploring adding a second floor to the church offices and Albracht Hall. This would supply much needed space for Sunday school, quilts, youth, and general meeting areas. Third, we are trying to develop nursery ministry for ages 0-4 during the 8:30 worship. Although I am a firm believer that worship is a family experience and I do not mind fidgety children, some folks get too flustered and need a reprieve from their young child(ren). Some stay away from worship for this reason. Fourth, Pastor Kevin is developing a focus group of unchurched folks from our school. The purpose is to find out their views of church, worship, and ministry. Based on these findings we may add an alternative worship experience and/or other events to share the Gospel and attract these folks into the life of the fellowship. Fifth, hurricanes Harvey and Irma wreaked havoc in people's lives. We were left fairly unscathed. In the coming months I would like to organize a week-long work party(ies) to go help some of the TX/FL folks.

These are exciting times for Redeemer. May the Holy Spirit bless us mightily and motivate us to be bold and brave to carry out the Lord's mission work, and help us give and take.

The 2017-2018 school year is off to a fantastic start! We have a record number of students, 301, enrolled in the school. We just dedicated the new Edward Steele Memorial Playground, which certainly enhances the campus and provides enjoyable play spaces for our students. Edward passed away in the spring. His granddaughter, Emily, is in our seventh grade. We sincerely thank Edward's widow, Karen Steele, for her loving generosity.

Our regular school routine was interrupted for a full week by Hurricane Irma. We thank God for keeping our campus and our church and school families safe during this storm. After being cooped up in their houses, many without electricity, most of the students seemed happy to get back to school on Thursday, September 14.

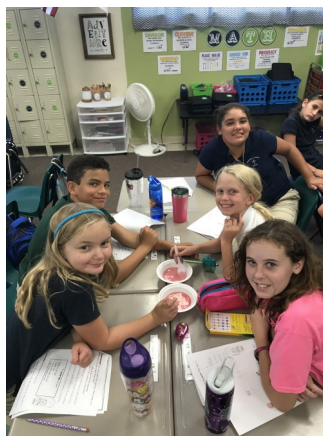
This year Mrs. Hascup has two after-school clubs. Engineering Club is for second-fourth grade students while Robotics Club is for children ages 9-12. Our students enjoy staying after school to participate in these educational clubs.

Many of our grade 5-8 students are participating in sports this fall. We have both varsity (grades 7-8) and junior varsity (grades 5-6) soccer and volleyball teams. Volleyball is open to only the girls. The soccer teams have mostly boys but also a couple of girls who prefer kicking a soccer ball over bumping and spiking a volleyball. Once again this fall Mike Cilurso is the head soccer coach while Janaina Miranda is the head volleyball coach.

Only four school staff members—Karyn McChrystal, Crislyn Grubb, Nick Utech, and I—are attending the Lutheran conference this fall. It is called The President's Equip Conference and is geared to church and school growth. Some other teachers will attend the Future of Educational Technology in Orlando in January.

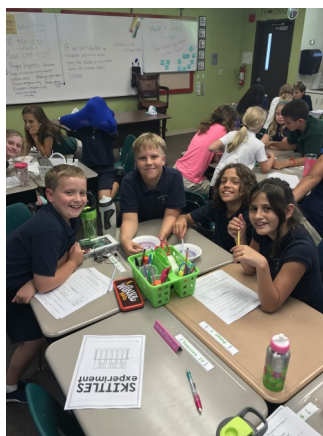

Classroom Connection - 5th Grade



Time flies when you're having fun in 5th grade! August and September have flown by as we have been busy learning and growing as a school family. We start each day with Luther's Morning Prayer, pledges, and devotions. In Religion, we have been talking about God's Law and the Gospel. We have read about the many names of God and what these reveal about Him.

The students have been learning to use their new Chrome books as they complete assignments in Google Classroom. Each week they work on a "Paragraph of the Week" based on a topic I have given them. The students complete these paragraphs in Google Classroom and are able to submit them to me online for grading. They have also enjoyed working on the beginning stages of their Digital Scrapbooks. Each month they will update their scrapbook with snapshots of what they are learning in class. At the end of the year they will have an entire scrapbook of their *Fifth Grade Adventures!*



In Science we have been studying Human Body systems as well as preparing for the Science Fair that is coming up in November.

We have been reading *The Indian in the Cupboard* as a class and the students are really enjoying this classic novel. We are looking forward to watching the movie when we finish reading the book. The students will get a chance to compare and contrast the various elements of the book versus the movie.



Our class mission project this year will benefit Place of Hope. We will be holding a diapers and wipes drive to help provide essentials for the babies under their care. We will be kicking this drive off in the upcoming month.

One of our favorite activities during the week is our Friday Reading Buddies with the kindergarten class. Each fifth grade student is paired up with a kindergarten buddy, and they spend time reading to their buddies from their favorite books. It is such a great experience for all the kids.

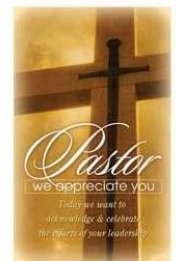

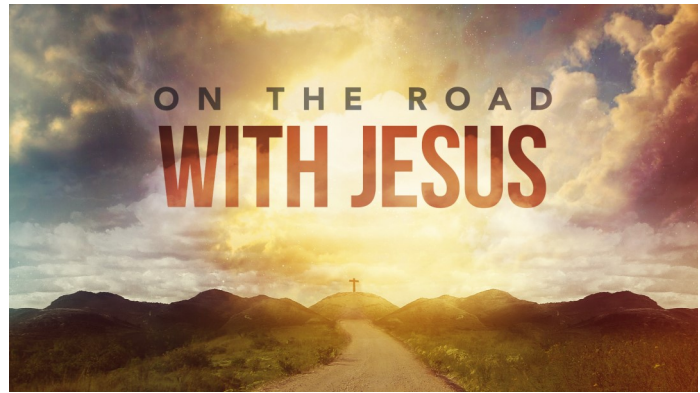

Properties Board Report

The Properties Board is happy to report that Redeemer’s campus held up fairly well against Hurricane Irma’s wrath. Thank you to the dozen or so individuals and families that turned out to put up and take down the shutters and to clean up the landscape debris. Besides lots of small tree branches and leaves to pick up, the awning cover by the back door of the CFC kitchen was blown away and found next door, a few shingles and flashing on Albracht Hall came off, and small leaks were discovered in the church and Albracht Hall.

Glitches were discovered in the hurricane shutter plan—many volunteers on the preparedness list did not turn out this time due to evacuations and poor communications, and some shutters were missing or were not secured properly. The Board will be addressing these issues and considering a plan to install accordion shutters and hurricane-resistant windows in place of some of the panel shutters currently in use. As the oldest of the roofs on campus, the roof on Albracht Hall and the church offices will be replaced.

Other recent property activities around campus: (1) the computer network was upgraded to alleviate a potential fire hazard and improve communication among the servers and computers, (2) two air conditioning units needed replacing (Redeemer has 30 or so), (3) the ice makers in the CFC kitchen and Albracht Hall were repaired, (4) samples of chairs to replace the folding chairs were received for people to try out, and the order will hopefully be received (along with storage racks) by the end of 2017, (5) fiber-reinforced panels have been ordered for the school entryway, the CFC kitchen, CFC lobby restrooms, and CFC upstairs restrooms, to hopefully be installed over Christmas break, and (6) the church projection system is in the process of being upgraded.

The Board welcomes more members, tradesmen and tradeswomen, handymen and handywomen, designers, and ideas for Redeemer. Please feel free to call Steve McCarthy (214-2043) for more information or to volunteer.
